Original Datasets

Rebellions in Late Medieval England (Complete)

The dataset geolocates rebelling counties for 32 civil conflicts during the late Medieval and early Renaissance periods in England (1226 to 1572).

Goods Distributed by English Monarchs (In Progress)

Combing grants, patents, and licenses from the Calendar of the Charter Rolls, Calendar of the Patent Rolls, and the Letters and Papers of Henry VIII, this dataset collects and categorizes all patents and grants distributed from every English monarch from Henry III to Elizabeth I. Over 350,000 grants, patents, and licenses are categorized into 25 types of goods (e.g., land, cash, government position, monopoly rights, etc.) and geolocated, when possible, to English counties.

Rebels and Loyalists During the Second Barons' War (In Progress)

This dataset digitizes the names of loyalists and rebels during England's Second Barons' War (1264 - 1267) and matches participants to the goods they accrued from the English crown prior to the war.

Royals in Civil Conflict (In Progress)

For every civil conflict in 33 European countries between 1000 and 1800, this dataset determines the familial relationship between principal combatants.
